# Successful Launch of 425

The Broom 425 was launched at the 2007 Southampton International Boat Show and immediately created considerable interest and many favourable comments. This interest proved genuine because Brooms came away from the show with several orders which will keep the 425 line busy until the 2008 Southampton Show.

A team from the premier boat journal the Motor Boat and Yachting carried out a test as the 425 was being delivered to the Southampton Boat Show. They made the following comments:

"From the outside, the 425 appears to offer few surprises. Bonded, frameless windows give a sleeker appearance to the superstructure, but the classic aft cabin Broom lines are all there. High guardrails, spacious foredeck, wide side decks that run all round the boat, enclosed seating area up top: they are all features that may not count highly on the glamour front, but for those who rate practicality, usability and safety ahead of sex-appeal, these are the kinds of features that will count.

For inland boaters negotiating locks, Broom's wide bathing platform steps, to port and starboard, must be nothing short of a godsend. For coastal boaters they're brilliant too, just for getting on and off the boat. It's the kind of small detail that goes some way to explaining Broom's reputation for user-friendly designs.

So what of the driving experience? Twin shafts and bow thruster will get even the most cack-handed journalist out of a tight berth, and at low speeds the boat tracks true, no doubt helped by its substantial keel.

Our 425 on test was fitted with the biggest engine



option of twin 435hp diesels, and was lighter than it might normally be with low levels of fuel and water. Bearing this in mind, the two Volvo Do's made short work of the Broom's 13 tonnes, giving effortless acceleration from a standing start to a lively top speed of 32 knots. Yet again, I had to remind myself what kind of boat I was on.

Light cherry wood is used throughout the saloon and the two spacious cabins, while sculpted door handles, angular tans and oblone hasins all contribute to the contemporary feel. Whether you like it or not is down to personal taste, of course, but for the industry-watchers it's a welcome sign that this 107-year-old British yard is determined not to be left behind, as the market gets even tighter."

Brooms were particularly pleased to read the reports opening remarks:

"We jumped on hoard shorth before its delivery to the Southampton Boat Show. It is not uncommon for new boats from other yards to be in a state of alarming disarray just days before their world premier. Broom, however, seem to have things more in order. The boat was immaculate inside and out."

It is good to know the efforts made by Brooms dedicated team are appreciated.

# Brooms Win Repeat Order

Brooms were delighted when Mr and Mrs Mike Whittemore decided to purchase their second Broom 50. Having had one of the earlier models, the Whittemores, when looking for a new boat, decided they could not find any craft that suited them so well. They kindly loaned the new Kelsie Jane to Brooms to display at Southampton International Boat Show in September when she was greatly admired.

After the Show she was delivered to her mooring at Bucklers Hard on the Beaulieu River.

The picture shows Mr and Mrs Whittemore standing on the new boat having transferred their equipment from Kelsie Jane the first. The Whittemores are now the third owners who have replaced their earlier Broom 50 with the latest model.

The first Kelsie Jane was returned to Brooms Service Centre where her new owner had a refit and his own equipment fitted. This will be the fifth Broom for her new owner who is moving up from a Broom 44.



This is a further example of the repeat business enjoyed by Brooms and which they value so highly.

# How we went about the design of the Broom 425

After joining the company in 2005, I knew it was one of my tasks to bring Broom's motor yacht designs into the 21st century. My first major project was the re-design of the replacement for the 42. Broom boats are always seen to be practical and functional. It was my challenge to retain this but take a new look at the aesthetics.



So how does the project start? From the outset I was given outline drawings from our naval architect Andrew Wolstenholme. After continuous brainstorming, I revised the exterior



window shapes and engine vent to give a modernised and elegant look, but still retain the ethos of a Broom boat.

Andrew and I discussed the layout and we came up with alternatives and chose the best proposal. After deriving a basic layout, I could then work on the interior design and styling. This involved the creation of a new joinery style, roof linings, and new fittings and fixtures. I knew

that Broom's had a much more classical appearance, so I had to be careful not to be too modern with my approach. Out came the notepad and I started sketching......





To begin with, the superstructure was designed to the drawings produced. The windows were mocked up, templates were made and sent to the relevant manufacturers to complete the superstructure mould tool and allow the new frameless windows to be manufactured.

As soon as the mouldings arrived at the factory it was my job to put my sketches into reality, working closely with both the joinery and boat building teams. Over four months the boat was manufactured and assembled, and finally the boat was tested. The boat was launched at the Southampton boat show and has proved to be a great success. I am pleased to be part of the team who pushed Broom's on the path to the future.

# Tabgha's Year

The first necessity is to explain why our wonderful Broom Ocean 38 is called Tabgha.

When we bought our first boat we struggled to find a unique name. The previous year we had visited The Sea of Galilee in Israel where there is a delightful place called Tabgha where Jesus fed the 5000. (Loaves and Fishes you may remember). Expecting to probably feed the 5000 again from our boat we called her after that place.



Tabgha was born in 1998 in Brundall, of course, and then was known as Anglian Rose. We found her in 2004 sitting forlornly and somewhat unloved on a hard standing by the Thames at Wargrave and found her immediately irresistible. Her twin 265TI Sabre Perkins Engines glyling us for the first time the nown was ununted to poslike constant activities. We have had a long term moorling at Harleyford but after several years we wanted to expand our wings beyond the non tidal Thames.

2005 saw us with Motor Boats Monthly cruises visiting Holland and by 2006 we were progressing into both cruises with the Broom Owners Club visiting Normandy and Motor Boats Monthly visiting Belgium and Holland.

2007 has been a marvellous year both for Tabgha and us. In March Tabgha took a low loader ride from Harleyford to Brundall where she had a fantastic makeover. New helm seats, upholstery and stainless steel work on the upper deck made her just like new again. Additions and refitting of some key aspects of her interior has taken years off her and she is getting lots of wolf whistles again. By May she was finished and serviced and we began our trips again by sea.

Brundall to Southampton via Lowestoft and Dover took 4 days. An interesting force 6 wind behind us and the tide in the right direction led to some brilliant surfing over the mouth of the Thames Estuary with the boat showing why Broom design is so good – her stability was fantastic.

We then met up with some Broom Owners Club friends on Erika, Kelsie Jane, and Midnight Blue (later) for a pre-planned three stage cruise through the Channel Islands, the Brittany Coast and then returning via Guernsey to the Normandy Coastal Ports. Each part lasted about 3 weeks with preplanned cheap flights home in-between.

The scenery was fantastic, the marinas excellent, the French food superb and the weather mixed! (Generally OK for boating but the previous years sunshine was somewhat lacking)

Highlights were the comradeship of fellow Broom owners and friends all united in owning and enjoying the wonderful opportunities and freedom that our superb Broom boat gives us. Thank you all at Broom.

## The Refurbishment of Dooby Soo

Dooby Soo is a Broom 37 Continental built in the early seventies, fitted with twin Perkins 145 horizontal engines, she had a white hull and green superstructure which was popular at the time.

Dooby Soo did not have the best of care in recent years and was in rather a sad state by 2006. She ended up being repossessed by a Finance House who offered her to Brooms. The Service Centre took on the challenge and set about a thorough refurbishment programme. All the windows were removed, completely stripped and rebuilt. Much of the exterior trim was replaced and the whole superstructure sprayed white.





The actual timber interior bulkheads and joinery were basically in good condition and after careful preparation, polishing and varnishing came up like new.

Whilst Dooby Soo was stripped down in Brooms Service Centre, she was spotted by the owners of a Broom 30, who liked what was being done and decided to purchase her. This allowed them to have all the new carpets, upholstery, curtains and covers to their choice.

Also as work progressed they were able to have their own requirements incorporated, which included extended aft canopy, bathing platforms, aft cabin double berth and invertor system.

This partnership with Brooms resulted in Dooby Soo looking like a new boat when she was recommissioned in 2007.

The basic GRP hull and main structure was all found to be in excellent condition.

Now renamed 'Isabella', her owners, who previously owned three Broom 30s over five years, are enjoying the extra space and cruising capacity of the 37.

They were looking for modern craft that were ideally suited for their particular waterway, which includes vast open expanses of Loch Ness and a lock and canal system that the charter boats shared with commercial traffic. The craft needed to be "Seaworthy" and of strong construction in addition to being attractive, practical and luxurious charter boat.

Caley have now taken mouldings for five different models from Aquafibre's extensive range and are currently building up a class of Aquafibre 35 Sedans, which Caley market as 'Eriskay'.

Once moulded at Aquafibre's factory at Rackheath, the bare hulls are filled with locally sourced components like windows and stainless steel guard rails and then transported by road to Inverness where Caley undertake the complete fitting out, to a very high specification and standard.

Caley's Director, Audrey Hogan, is particularly pleased with the new Eriskay which are replacing an ageing fleet of Princess 32's. "The Eriskays are booking extremely well and our customers are delighted with the layout we have provided and the general performance of the craft - they are ideal for couples with two children".

# Broom Chosen to Prepare Ocean Pirate for 2008 Round Britain Powerboat Race

Broom were very pleased to be selected by Ocean Pirate's owner, Mike Barlow, to prepare her for the 2008 round Britain Powerboat Race.

Ocean Pirate has an interesting history. Built near to Brooms by the former Brooke Marine Yard at Lowestoft in 1968 with an aluminium hull. A forty footer, she was the first of a series of this model which were sold



both as private cruisers and for commercial purposes. She was exhibited at the San Francisco Boat Show and on her return to the UK she was entered in the 1969 round Britain powerboat race, finishing seventh overall.

On hearing that the race was to be repeated in 2008, Mike Barlow decided to enter Ocean Pirate in the Classic Class and take her round again.

Brooms Service Centre was chosen to undertake the task of replacing the Cummins engines with the latest Quantum Series Cummins producing 355hp each. With new shafts and four bladed propellers Ocean Pirate's speed will be increased to over 30 knots.

The work involved removing part of the wheelhouse roof, altering the engine beds and installing the new units.

By coincidence Ocean Pirate is the second Brooke Marine built vessel at Brooms which recently had an engine change carried out by their Service Centre. This specialist job is a further example of the variety of jobs that can be undertaken by Brooms.
