2022/23 BROOM OWNERS CLUB ANNUAL REPORT CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

This is the time, as Chairman, that I report on my year in the role, to the Club. Let me begin by saying it's been a busy year, and eventful. The committee has worked hard for the Club and has delivered, too. The Club continues to grow and our membership is now around the 550 mark - that's 550 Broom boats of all sizes and models - with members throughout Europe and Ireland as well as in the UK. The present structure of the Club divides it into regions, and our Regional Co-ordinators are the heart-beat of the Club. Presently, they include:

Peter Ward who has been Eastern Region Co-ordinator, in post since 2020. During his tenure **Peter** has seen the region grow and his regular coffee mornings have helped members meet each other, whilst his newsletters have kept them informed. **Peter** has also been involved with work to ensure the Broads bridges operate, working with others to keep pressure on the various authorities concerned, to minimise delay and speed up works where necessary. The highlight of the region is the Beccles meet and this year, the third that **Elaine Ward** has organised, saw a record number of boats attending. Unfortunately, **Peter and Elaine** will stand down at the AGM, as they intend to spend more time cruising, particularly in Holland and perhaps further afield. This is our largest region, and it needs a Co-ordinator. Whilst Beccles will continue, once again with the help of **Jane Neale**, as I write, we do not yet have a volunteer to take on **Peter's** role. Could this be you?

Don Walker, who heads up the European region, and has maintained a steady and enthusiastic membership, and the second, very successful, Naarden meet saw another gathering with our Dutch, German and English members, who enjoyed a very international event, once again ably led and coordinated by **Keith and Carole Rowe**. **Don** has been in the role for a number of years and is now looking for a replacement. Whilst he intends to continue for the immediate future, it would be really good if a replacement could be found now. A full description of the Coordinator role is on the web-site, so please have a look and put your name forward if you can.

Pete Fishwick, the Ireland Co-ordinator. Pete had an immediate and continuing impact when he took on the role in 2020. He founded a *WhatsApp* group to facilitate communications and holds coffee mornings, which allow members to meet up and get to know each other. They also attract new members, and Pete has had a very successful three years, his hard work in rejuvenating the region, without a Co-ordinator since 2016, being rewarded by a steady and very noticeable increase in new members - the Ireland region is up and running again!

Alan Foden is the South East Co-ordinator and employed the services of **Keith Rowe** to hold a very successful technical meeting through *Zoom*, where members were able to resolve many issues and receive some helpful advice and answers to their many questions, too.

Gill Oldham co-ordinates the South Coast, with its many successful events, but perhaps the crowning moment amongst many was the weekend visit **Gill** organised to the RNLI College in Poole. Sadly, this will be **Gill's** swan song. After many years in various roles both supporting and leading the Club, **Gill** is standing down, which is very sad news indeed. Again, a new Co-ordinator is required. The region has many active members so, as in other regions, the Co-ordinator doesn't have to do all the work. The key is in the title – 'Co-ordinator'. Does that sound like something you could do to contribute to the smooth running of the Region? If so, please put your name forward. You'll be very well received and made very welcome, too.

The news in the Thames region is better. **Terry Sharp** volunteered for and has been co-opted onto the Role as Thames Region Co-ordinator, and has also agreed to stand for election at this year's AGM. **Terry** has already held a successful event on the Thames and has plans for the future. It's really great to see our second largest region one again with an active Co-ordinator, so a big welcome on board to **Terry**.

Meanwhile, the Central Region is presently without a Co-ordinator, so past Chairman **Peter Bentley** has been keeping an eye on things and will hopefully be able to pass on the mantle at the AGM.

In the other regions, with smaller membership numbers, we have Representatives whose role is to help and advise visiting Broom owners as well as to encourage members to join in the BOC fun. Last year, our long-standing representative in the Channel Islands, **Peter Donne Davis**, stood down. We haven't yet found a replacement, but in the meantime, Peter is always ready to offer a helpful suggestion to visiting BOC members. I'm grateful to **Peter**, as indeed I'm grateful to all the Regional Representatives for carrying out these roles and for ensuring that the BOC continues to be represented everywhere. These include **Sandy Aitken** in Scotland; **Bevan Kendall**, who this last year has been helped by **Jane Neale**, in the South West and **Keith Tristram** in the Western Region. Thank you all for the time and assistance you give to the Club.

The Co-ordinators and Representatives have been ably assisted by the other committee members, who have given a lot of their time and knowledge to ensuring the Club continues to meet the requirements of members. These include Vice Chairman and Technical Co-ordinator, **Keith Rowe**, who has been busy offering technical savvy both at regional events and individually to members, as well as organising, together with Carole, that very successful Naarden event. Keeping the Club financially secure is our erstwhile Treasurer, **David Evans**, striving successfully in this vital role to ensure the Club remains solvent. **David** is standing down this year, and it is very much hoped that the Club will vote to elect **Debbie Eames**, whose expertise and enthusiasm will be of great benefit to the Club. Web Master **Louise Busby**, having successfully implemented the transition from the old to the new website, has been overseeing the smooth running of this centrally important function, keeping it up to date and helping members with its

use. Last October, **Karen Fishwick** successfully took over the role of Membership Secretary, a very forward-facing job, which provides the first point of contact for all prospective members. This is a continuing vital role and, as membership grows, an increasingly busy one, and it is very much appreciated that **Karen** took on this task and carries it out so efficiently.

After 13 years in the role, I was able to pass on the baton of editing and producing the Club magazine to **Jocelyn Jones** and I can happily say that I haven't been missed! **Jocelyn** has accepted the challenge with alacrity and is now seamlessly putting together her second edition, after a very successful and well received Spring 2023, first edition.

Observant readers will have noticed two names missing from my listing of the hard-working Committee. The first is that of **John Oldham**, our General Secretary, who has worked tirelessly over the last 12 years to ensure the Club has remained legal, has met with data protection and Health and Safety requirements and the tenets of the Constitution and, more importantly, has kept a number of Chairmen, including myself, on the straight and narrow and free from embarrassing mistakes. Having suffered somewhat from ill health, **John** has decided to stand down from this heavy role. However, he's not entirely giving up all his work for the Club, as he's volunteered to deal with aspects of Club communication, which have become a part of his growing Secretarial duties, until someone can be found to take his place. I'm very happy with this, and there is no doubt that the Club owes a great debt of gratitude to **John**, for his consistent and invaluable work and the giving of his expertise, to help the Club's continuing success.

Who then will take over? Step forward **Linda Varney**. Linda has been shadowing John for a number of months now and many of you will know Linda from her former role as Membership Secretary, which she took over in 2011, overseeing the applications of many members during the past eleven years, subsequently taking on the role of National Events Co-ordinator at the last AGM. Here, **Linda** has been equally impressive, chairing the 20th Anniversary Planning Group, and organising not only the new-format AGM, but also our presence at the Southampton International Boat Show. Here, her endeavours led to us winning a competition for a free site at the show, plus a cash prize of £500, which covered all the expenses and set up costs for the show, enabling us to purchase new equipment which will serve the Club for future events, too. Altogether an accomplished all-round achievement, benefiting the Club and attracting new members.

Linda is a wonderful example of someone quietly working away to ensure the success of the Club, and I hope members will join me in voting for **Linda** to succeed John as the next General Secretary. As you can easily see, I am indebted to **John** and **Linda** for all their efforts on behalf of the Club both during my year as Chairman and before and I am sure you will all agree that they deserve a really big vote of thanks.

Of course, I am very aware that many of the committee would not be successful in their roles without the support of their partners, who put up with absences due to committee meetings and time spent on various duties, as well as for all the suggestions and help that partners provide towards the smooth running of the Club. To all of them, committee members, Regional Representatives and partners alike, I offer my gratitude and thanks.

The Club would definitely not survive in its present format without all the hard work and expertise they provide.

This leads nicely onto positions on the Committee and the vacancies that will arise this year. Could you be the one to volunteer to take over and keep this great Club running? It does, of course, take, up some time, but its not unmanageable and all the roles are very rewarding in their own right. Elsewhere in the AGM paperwork are nomination forms for Committee posts. They are all roles important to the smooth running and success of the Club. If you can help at all, then please put your name forward. We need you and we would love to hear from you.

If we cannot fill the posts, and some have been vacant for quite a time, then this could lead to a re-evaluation of the structure of the Club, how it operates and how it is organised. Perhaps regions could merge? Do we need a regional structure at all? The structure works well, but if we cannot fill Co-ordinator roles then we will have to think again. Your committee will be examining this over the coming year, but if, in the meantime, you would like to make any suggestions or offer any advice on the existing structure and organisation of the Club, then please let me, or any member of the Committee, know. Your input would be very much appreciated.

As Chairman, I have had a year of variety and interest and have met a good number of members. I had a great time in Norwich, attending **Keith and Carole Rowe's** presentation to 'new to sea-going' crews and potential UK participants in the 2023 Naarden event. It was a very well attended and successful evening, which gave a lot of encouragement to those aiming to take their boats to sea for the first time.

I also had a good evening with Thames members, attending **Terry Sharp's** first event, a weekend meeting based at *Tingedene's* Thames and Kennet (T&K) Marina, which involved a lot of fun, some pubs and apparently a shopping trip (I'll leave **Terry** to explain) and a jolly supper at the *T&K* Marina on-site bar and cafe. It was a thoroughly enjoyable event and very good to see Thames members once again participating in a Regional event.

With next year's 20th anniversary in mind, I set up a working group to plan how the Club should celebrate it. Chaired by **Linda Varney**, it includes **Keith Rowe, Peter Ward** and **Graham Eames** and the centre piece will be a Pageant, attracting as many Broom boats as possible, of all types, at the spiritual home of Broom Boats in Brundall, over the late May Bank Holiday, in 2024. Whilst this will be the Club's central celebration, it's also hoped that Regions will organise

local celebrations too, but on a different date. Additionally, we aim to produce an anniversary book - a year book - together with photographs and notes on all members' boats to provide a snapshot of the Club in its 20th year and a history of the Club to date. The book will be available for members to purchase as a lasting memento. Ideas for inclusion will be very welcome.

Although we no longer have the same relationship with *Broom Boats* as formerly, I wrote to the Managing Director (MD), explaining our intentions, and received a positive response, This has been enhanced following a meeting **Keith** and **Peter** had with the MD. I also wrote to **James Fraser** of Norfolk Yacht Agency, and again received a very positive response. It all augers well for a memorable 20th anniversary celebration. We hope you can be there.

Earlier in the year, I initiated a major, Club wide survey, which provided some interesting results. Statistically relevant, the survey achieved 177 responses, 35% of the Club membership. The responses will help to guide the direction of the Club to meet the requirements of members. In the conduct of the survey, I was very pleased to have the help and expertise of **Carole Rowe**, who put the whole exercise together and provided the collation and analysis of the results. It was a very worthwhile exercise, and I am very grateful to **Carole** for all her assistance.

To give support to Regional Coordinators, **Keith Rowe** and I held a Zoom meeting with them all, aimed at sharing information between regions and promoting suggestions and co-operation between them. It was successful and it is intended that this becomes a regular annual event.

Together with the Treasurer I looked at the Club insurance cover. The policy, which is a standard RYA recommended type, negotiated through the RYA approved broker, provides cover in bands of membership numbers. It was found not to cover Club activities in Europe or Ireland, and this has now been rectified. Nor were we covered for our growing membership, and so we raised our band of cover accordingly, to cater for our 500+ membership level. Both these necessary actions have resulted in a higher premium, as shown in the Club accounts.

The accounts also show a loss with regard to AGMs due to the very low number of members who attended last year. The Committee took the decision that we could not hold AGMs as previously and risk more Club funds. We then had to cancel the proposed 2023 AGM at *Dunston Hall Hotel & Spa*, as the deposit we had paid was due to increase incrementally over time and we could not guarantee that members would attend in the numbers they had done, pre-Covid. This led to us having to forfeit the £500 deposit we had paid. We are constitutionally required to hold an AGM, so this year we are trying a new format by holding it on one day, rather than the traditional two/three day weekend, with an emphasis on members making their own reservations for any accommodation requirements, and with a dinner in the evening, based on only a small number of members attending, thus reducing the size of deposit, and potential loss, the Club would have had to pay.

We have re-contracted with *Dunston Hall* to hold the AGM there, and with the good offices of **Elaine Ward**, we managed to retrieve the previously lost deposit, which is being used to cover the conference room hire and associated costs for this year's AGM. We have kept costs down to the minimum and have contracted for just 15 meals for the dinner, which we had to undertake to pay for. We already have more than 15 members staying for the dinner, so the cost of the dinners will be covered. This has kept costs to the minimum for the Club and reduced further risks to Club funds.

We still do not have as many members attending as previously, so this year we will set up a Zoom link to enable members to attend remotely. Additionally, this should enable members in Ireland and Europe to attend in a more accessible manner, although it would be lovely to see members from those regions at the AGM meeting, too. At present, a number of members are meeting on the Friday evening, informally, and will be attending the AGM itself and the evening meal. You are very welcome to attend all or part of the planned AGM events. Just let Linda Varney know as soon as possible.

Whether this will be a successful AGM format and a pattern for future AGMs, remains to be seen. We need further input from you, in addition to that provided in the survey, and the future conduct of AGMs will be on the agenda this year. Please think about it and do let us have your comments. We would very much like to hear your comments and suggestions for how the AGM should be conducted in the future.

Whilst within the Regions we have had a number of successful events this year, we have also had a successful National event too, at the Southampton International Boat Show (SIBS), as outlined above. Many members came to visit our Stand and importantly, many members gave up of their time to help, both in its construction and its staffing. I would particularly like to single out **David Harrison** for his sterling work in both designing and constructing the stand, his help during SIBS to make it more secure as the weather deteriorated and his willingness to take it all down at the end. He's since patched up the wind damage and made some improvements for its use, and the Stand will continue to be useful for differing BOC events in the future. Thank you, **David**. The Club is grateful for your continuing contributions to its success.

BOC was also at another boat show, Boat Life 2023, held at the NEC in February. Linda Varney, Don Walker, Keith Rowe and myself visited with the aim of assessing its suitability as a location for future BOC involvement. It turned out not to be a show for the BOC, but we did make some valuable contacts, with agreements to pay for advertising in *Sweeping Statements* and we now have a number of paid-for advertisements in the magazine. This is the way forward to enable our splendid magazine to continue, in the face of rising costs. If you know of any firm or service provider who might pay for an advertisement in the magazine, please let me, or one of the Committee, know. We need more advertisers, and we need your help in securing them. We

also need someone to run the programme, keep a record of who has paid for what, raise invoices through the Treasurer and generally co-ordinate the advertising. Could this be you? It would be a great way to get involved and help the Club. Interested? Let me know and I'll be happy to hand it over!

In the past we had an arrangement with *Nav&Gen* which gave members a 10% discount on boat insurance, plus free legal cover and No Claims Bonus (NCB) protection. They also contributed £500 to Club funds. Following a recent review, *Nav&Gen* have informed us that they will no longer be able to contribute the £500 and they have removed the free legal cover and NCB protection too, apparently due to changes in Financial Conduct Authority rules. Whilst they cannot re-instate the other benefits, the 10% discount on policy costs is still available. I have asked them instead to take out a full-page ad in the Club magazine, at a cost of £500, and this is still being negotiated. In the meantime, without in any way jeopardising our 10% discount, I am negotiating with other insurers. So far, I have agreed with *Craft Insure* that they will take out an advertisement with us, and I will be interested in member's experiences should they decide to use this broker. I am also negotiating with other insurers to see if we can achieve some beneficial arrangements with them. Please let me know if you have any views on this subject.

There is a great deal of fun and enjoyment to be had from being Chairman, and one of the great joys is being able to recognise and reward the individual efforts of members who help make this Club what it is. During the past 12 months, I've had the very pleasant opportunity to award a Chairman's Letter of Commendation to a number of members, including **Carole Rowe** for her work and expertise in conducting the recent Club-wide survey of members and **David Harrison**, **Linda Varney** and **Peter Smith** for their expertise and skills in contributing to the successful Club Stand at SIBS. They were all richly deserved and acknowledge the enthusiasm that individual members have for the Club and the input they make to ensure its success. Any member can nominate another for the for the award, and it is a fine way to celebrate members' extra contributions, which benefits the Club. If you have someone in mind, please nominate them to the Committee.

There is also another award the Club can make. **Frank Hawkins**, together with **David Broad** and **Jane Neale**, make up the Martin Broom Memorial Trophy Awards Committee. Annually this awards the Trophy to a member, or a group of members, who have made an outstanding contribution to promoting, supporting or reporting on the use of *Broom* Boats. The presentation of the cup is made at the AGM, The criteria are deliberately left open, so as to encourage as many nominations as possible, and members can enter themselves, nominate other members, or simply encourage individuals or groups to enter the competition for what really is a prestigious award, presented in memory of the late Martin Broom. I await with interest to see

if it has been awarded this year, and who the winner may be. It could be you, but you have to be in it to win it!

This, then, has been my year as Chairman of the Club. Many of the Committee are volunteering to stay on in their roles, as am I and, with their support and your encouragement, we hope to take the Club into its 20th year, stronger, growing and continuing to help members make the most of their great Broom boats. Thank you for your support.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Secretary's duties of ensuring the smooth-running of the business of the Club have returned to their pre-Covid pattern, with meetings no longer restricted by measures aimed at preventing the spread of infection. However restricting this may have been, some useful lessons were learnt from lockdown, of which, the development of video-conferencing is likely to remain a useful addition to the way the Club communicates with members. It offers a way of sharing ideas and experience that meets the needs of Clubs and organisations with a wide-spread membership such as the BOC. I have been involved in administering and setting up a number of such virtual meetings.

Three face-to-face committee meetings have taken place since the 2022 AGM in Portsmouth, and one *Zoom* meeting in February. The early-year committee meeting has often been dogged by adverse weather and travel restrictions, so committee has proposed that future winter meetings take place virtually. Such meetings require the acquisition of suitable equipment as well as some knowledge and experience if they are to be effective. This is not a simple matter, as the Club needs to provide for participants attending both at a physical meeting and remotely. Ultimately, the potential for holding *Zoom* Regional and interest group meetings, viewing of committee meetings and interactive technical teach-ins are some of the benefits that could be gained. Committee is currently exploring the purchase of equipment, spurred on by the promise to allow remote access to the AGM,

In addition to setting up and administering documents and meetings, I have also been responsible for formatting and sending out bulk messages to both whole-Club and Regional groups. Bulk messaging requires the use of software packages, all of which have aspects that are better-suited to commercial needs than those of a Club such as the BOC. 'Free' services generally restrict the number of recipients that can be circulated or do not offer the flexibility and convenience of more sophisticated systems. Communication is a very important aspect of the life of the Club. The increasing range of possible ways of providing Club information - Magazine, web-site, E-mail, *Facebook, WhatsApp*, messaging etc - make it increasingly difficult to ensure that no member is excluded from the benefits of membership.

After more than a dozen years as Secretary, I have decided not to put my name forward for reelection. However. I am aware that I have taken on the bulk E-mail process and a number of other related aspects of communication which it would be difficult for anyone to take on without a significant induction process. I am happy to maintain these tasks until someone with the time and software familiarity is able to take them on.

FINANCIAL REPORT

I have pleasure in presenting the accounts for the financial year ending 31 August 2023. Members will see that we have incurred a substantial loss this year of £4,758.54 as against a projected budget deficit of £1,447. We still retain a satisfactory reserve of a little over £8,000.

The reason for the deficit arises from the problems with the 2022 AGM in Portsmouth. Members will recall that our chosen venue had been denied us as a result of the government requisitioning the hotel to accommodate migrants. As a result, your committee – in particular **Gill** and **John Oldham** – had to do some rapid reorganisation to put in place an AGM by the published date. The attendance at the AGM was not on the level of previous years and as a result, the event overall showed a loss of just over £3,500 (see below). This was compounded by the fact that of the event income, £2,585 was accounted for in the previous financial year which meant that the effective deficit due to the 2022 AGM in these accounts was £5,136.89.

As of the 31 August 2023, we had 536 paid-up members which was an increase of approximately 30 over the preceding year. This continuing upward trend in membership indicates a healthy club. The increasing numbers, however, do pose their own problems in terms of administration and administrative costs. In these accounts, we have also had to deal with the significant effect of inflation; this can best be seen, for example, in magazine costs which rose by over £1,700!

Your committee knew this year was going to be a difficult one in that we were budgeting for a deficit of £1,450. In the circumstances, the resulting deficit is significantly under that which you would expect from the foregoing.

Looking forward to next year, the increase in subscriptions will enable continued growth of the club to be properly supported and should provide a small contribution to the reserve, which is a little on the low side for a club with over 500 members.

A statement comparing the Profit and Loss of the Club for its financial years 2021/22 and 2022/23 is given on page 8, together with the Club year-end Balance Sheet and a copy of the Independent Accounts Examiner's certificate on page 9 below.

SUBSCRIPTION RATE FROM 1st NOVEMBER 2024

At each AGM, members are asked to agree the subscription rate that is to apply for the Club year commencing 12 months ahead i.e. in this case from November 2024/25. Based on the budget forecast I have made; I am happy to propose the motion:

That the subscription rate from November 2024 should remain uncharged at those that apply to the current Club year i.e. £30 for UK members and £35 or €40 for those residing outside GB.



Thank you all for your continued efforts to promote the Club and its benefits and I hope that it will continue to grow in 2024.

WEB REPORT

It has been another busy year for the Club web-site, with more and more members finding their way to the site and new members joining regularly. Since adding the facility to join online this has been the principal route for signing up new members and we have recently added the facility for new members to pay by credit/debit card making the process even easier. We are attracting increasing numbers of Broom owners from further afield attracted by the online community and technical support available. This is borne out by the activity on the technical forum and the enquiries which come through for the Technical Co-ordinator. These are always dealt with swiftly and efficiently and often lead to the person wanting to join the club. We are averaging around 2000 visitors a month, with around 500 of these being first time visitors, indicating that we are attracting nonmembers interested in finding out more about the club as well as drawing our own members to the site. We have reduced our list of never-visited members to about 140 from almost 200 last year, something to continue to work on in the

coming year!

Further development of the technical information on the site has taken place this year in conjunction with **Keith and Carole Rowe** and we now offer a section dedicated to heritage documents including historical news reports,

documentation from the early years of *Broom Boats* and the popular history book which was published in 2011. I have also continued to update the members' home page to include more recent BOC activities on the photo slide show, and to reflect the increased membership on the Club statistics panel. Club events have been added for Regional Co-ordinators where requested and these appear on the Club events calendar and also on the home page. Updated membership documents have been uploaded when available to give up-to-date information for members.

I have also added an FAQ page which points members and visitors to key areas of the site and helps them to get the most out of the information on offer. This is promoted via a QR code on the new members' letter so that they can get up and running straight away. If you are unsure how to access the site or find various features then you can also try scanning the code with your phone camera and you should be taken straight to the page to find out more.



Future development - there are several projects in the pipeline to add functionality to the site including expanding the Offers and discounts section to promote our commercial partners and also to make owners' boats for sale visible to non-members who may be interested in them. We intend to do this alongside increasing the visibility of boat brokers who are *Broom* specialists so that potential new owners can find their way to their new boat as easily as possible.

Earlier in the year we had a successful Technical *Zoom* meeting with the Ireland region which **Pete Fishwick** arranged and then we had a further meeting with the South Coast region arranged by **Gill Oldham**. We had good participation from members at both events and we had an excellent response from members at these sessions. I am happy to hold further Technical *Zoom* sessions over the winter in other regions if this is required by members. I receive regular correspondence via emails and messages from members on technical matters which I enjoy receiving. In addition to this there are often technical queries or requests for information on our *Facebook* page. Eastern Region Report

Eastern Region is in good shape with a high level of interaction amongst members, especially in the Norfolk Broads area where rapport is facilitated by the proximity of a large contingent within a relatively confined area.

This intimacy is a key enabler of continued modest growth of membership, supported by the monthly 'Heads Up' newsletter that maintains member engagement and a sense of belonging.

The boating season has been plagued by the ongoing bridge and lock closures on The Broads. The Club has represented the views and frustrations of members to various stakeholders involved, and now receives regular updates such is our presence and engagement.

The restrictions have meant that the Broads have effectively been land-locked for long periods, meaning that Club cruises to sea have not been possible this year. We are still trying to arrange a simple cruise from Great Yarmouth to Lowestoft, for which many members have expressed an interest; but having launched the idea over 12 months ago it's yet to happen.

As a means of keeping in touch, members have in good numbers supported a few coffee mornings throughout the season, including a combined coffee morning and factory visit in October.

The annual rally in Beccles over the August bank holiday proved once again to be the highlight of the season, with 27 boats and around 60 people attending. An extensive and informative programme of entertainment was well supported; photos and video have been posted to the website to showcase the spectacle of the Broom flotilla, plus the vast enjoyment of owners, crew and guests.

To avoid conflict with the AGM we brought the regional Laying up supper forward to the end of September, giving members the chance to join by boat prior to winterisation, and in more comfortable weather than last year when we encountered the winter's first heavy freeze. This proved popular, with thirty-six attending. Indeed, as well as the excellent dinner at the popular *Waters Edge*, the lovely weather enabled members to make a weekend of it, which included the spontaneous arrangement of a large game of cricket on Bramerton Common.

It is pleasing that the few organised events have been very well supported and the stimulus of great camaraderie, the formation of new friendships and the catalyst for many other self-initiated boating activities amongst members.

I was somewhat embarrassed by the confusion that surrounded the planning of next year's

20th Anniversary celebrations, and the potential conflict with the region's principal event. Whilst pleased that the tradition of Beccles has been saved, I am disappointed that respected colleagues found it so hard to listen and accept that we, the planning committee, had initially got it wrong - and that a change of direction was needed. The matter unfortunately caused some unnecessary animosity and lack of respect; but we got there eventually, with the pageant and other festivities to be held over the late May bank holiday. This means the tradition of the region's annual rally in Beccles over the August bank holiday is maintained. After careful consideration I have decided not to stand for re-election at the AGM and I look forward to handing over to my successor in due course. I am pleased that **Jane Neale** has offered to take over the organisation of Beccles from **Elaine**.

Whilst it has been a privilege for us both to be involved in our respective roles in the region, we are looking forward to approaching the 2024 boating season with a little more freedom, and we'd like to thank everyone for their tremendous support and the friendships that we've wholly enjoyed.

These are great craft and a strong Owners Club will ensure that we keep them going for many years to come.
